MISSION IMPACT

Red Cross Blood Drive

The Red Cross Blood Drive was held Saturday, May 20, with 49 units of blood collected. Since October of 1997, St. John's has hosted 62 Blood Drives, yielding 3,167 units of blood! We have grown from one to three blood drives per year. The essence of the Blood Drive remains the same: people helping people, fellowship, and the best "free" breakfast in town! Red Cross offers many essential services that meet the emergency needs of others.

Hopedale Growing Project

This year marks the twentieth anniversary of partnering with Hopedale Mennonite Church for the Hopedale Growing Project. This Spring, St. John's raised \$8,640 for land rental on which Hopedale Mennonite Church farmers planted a soybean crop. St. John's contribution and proceeds from the crop, less expenses, will go toward a project teaching sustainable farming techniques in Mwenezi, Zimbabwe. Proceeds will be distributed after the fall harvest, which celebrates the bounty of God's creation and the blessings of community.

Vacation Bible School

Vacation Bible School was held June 12-15 for ages 5 through 5th grade. The theme this year was Spark Studios. A daily offering collected more than \$2,000 towards the Zambia Education Fund. Kids and adults alike had a memorable week bringing glory to God!

Zambia Education Fund

The Zambia Education Fund was created by the St. John's Mission Outreach Team in 2011 to help the pastors of a Lutheran synod in Zambia. These pastors serve poor congregations and have very small incomes. In June, members of St. John's donated \$12,000 to this fund. The money will be sent to Zambia through the Chicago office of the ELCA in time for the 2024 school year.

Mary: Recently the Central/Southern Illinois Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) held its annual Assembly. This year elections for a new bishop were held due to Bishop Roth retiring after serving two consecutive six-year terms.

Martha: How does the election process work? Is it based on experience?

Mary: The Spirit works through the many pastors in the synod to nominate others who they believe could fill this leadership role. Then the potential candidates are notified and given time for discernment. The initial ballot at the Assembly contains the names of those who agreed to be considered.

Martha: Was St. John's represented at the Synod Assembly? If so, were they able to vote for the new bishop?

Mary: Yes, St. John's had the following voting representatives: Pastor David, Deacon Lyn, Cynthia Davis, Barb Haab, Jolie Hoffman, David Johnson, and Joel Murphy. After a series of ballots, the two nominees who received the most votes were presented in the fifth and final ballot. Pastor Greg Bushboom, Lead Pastor from St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Springfield, was elected.

Martha: How will this leadership transition impact St. John's here in Bloomington?

Mary: God has many future plans for our congregation and the others in this Synod. We must trust that God will provide guidance to the new bishop as he accepts this call to lead. If we listen and watch with open hearts, we, too, will understand what plans are for each of us individually and collectively as a congregation.

Emily attended Unit 5 schools and graduated from Normal West. She is now working on her Associates' degree from Heartland.

She's worked with non-profit Project Transformation Tennessee, working with churches suffering dwindling attendance. She's also served summer reading programs to help close the reading gap for children. During the pandemic, she coordinated virtual reading buddies. In 2021, she was a House Pastor to promote spiritual growth among the interns in Nashville. Quite the resumé!

Children seem to be the family business! Her mom is the director of Noah's Ark Preschool and Emily volunteered in the classrooms.

Her duties at St. John's are working on activities for Joy Zone. The model recently changed to free-floating stations, allowing kids to learn through art, building, cooking, or science. Junior and senior high youth often help, giving the children more "safe" people to talk to if they need somebody less intimidating than adult to talk to.

Miss Emily is involved in children's ministry planning, providing curriculum to Thrive guides, service nights, Thrive group learning events and Chaos.

Emily is hopeful for the future as that's what our children are—the future. While the pandemic stunted the groups, junior high youth are beginning to invite their friends to activities which should continue growth into high school. She's aware that priorities are changing and hopes parents will help their families recommit to children's spiritual lives.



Her Grandma inspired her faith through demonstrating Christian love. Emily learned how to recognize when a child needs a break and how they interact with one another. She enjoys the innocence of young children and marvels at their growth. Over the years, she's learned how to focus on the social and mental well-being of a child.

Emily's favorite vacation spot is Branson, Missouri, spending time with family and Silva, North Carolina, for the beauty of the Blue Ridge Mountains. One of her favorite hobbies is watching sports, particularly anything University of Tennessee! She also loves horses, a good hammock, and music concerts.

From Mourning to Jou

The journey of life can often find us facing unexpected turns and unplanned sorrows. The death of a loved one or the end of a marriage can leave us emotionally and physically drained. Having a loving community of fellow believers walking with us in these moments can be an important step in the journey of healing.

GriefShare and Divorce Care are two resources providing a Christian/Biblical perspective to what participants are going through. Through video teaching and discussion, individuals can see how Jesus makes a difference in their experience.

St. John's member Jim Dumouchel shared the following about his experience as a GriefShare participant, "The one thing that all attendees shared is that we were on a grief journey. Some losses were recent and some were several years ago. We were all at a different place along

the path. As for me, I have been on the journey for three years. I had tried two individual counselors and a group session. All helped me move forward, but I still lacked something. GriefShare is scripture based and helped clarify several of my deepest feelings, so I could continue to move forward. I am not finished, but GriefShare gave me the tools I need."

Likewise those who participated in Divorce Care were in various stages of separation/divorce. Each person had the opportunity to share thoughts, feelings, and questions as they needed in a safe and caring shared community.

The words of Galatians 6:2 call us to bear one another's burdens. By walking alongside the broken hearted we are answering the call of Christ. GriefShare and Divorce Care have allowed us to do this in a way that honors the individual's unique experience and journey of healing.
