Our church is called St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church. Our name exemplifies Jesus' work on earth. Having been married for 45 years, they are a well-oiled, welcoming machine. According to Roger, welcoming people comes naturally for Sharon, but he needed to work at it. So, instead of gathering with his usual coffee companions, Roger intentionally seeks out new people. Roger and Sharon both let the visitor know, there are no strings attached, and they're not going to pressure them to sign up for anything.

They can do this because they've been in the spot of the stranger. Haven't we all? It can be traumatic. We can all probably identify—feeling uncomfortable or alone when visiting a new church. The Hellmans ask, "WWJD?" With Jesus' example and the Holy Spirit's help, everyone can be inviting and welcoming.

For many of us, it means stepping outside of our comfort zones, just as Jesus' first disciples did. They paved a path for us by following Jesus' example.

In many ways, we have it much easier than early Christians. And even today, there are many countries where Christians are persecuted just for declaring God's love. As blessed as we are here and now, we can take a risk and invite someone to church or extend a welcoming hand and smile to a newcomer. It accomplishes the one thing we need—More of Him.



Vacation Bible School met in person for the first time since the pandemic.
Rocky Railway was the theme and 65 children learned about the power of Jesus in our lives. We were blessed to have more than 100 volunteers to make the week wonderful! Children and adults collected offerings each day for the Zambia Education Fund. A goal of \$1,500 was set, and together they

exceeded the goal, collecting more than \$2,700!

#### **Zambia Education Fund**

Each year, St. John's sponsors this fund to help pastors in Zambia pay for their childrens' education expenses. Videos, which explained why the campaign is crucial, were shown during worship services for a couple of weeks. As in the past, we reached the requested \$12,000 goal; in fact, we exceeded it! Thank you for helping the pastors in Zambia fund the education of their children.

### **Hopedale Harvest Project**

St. John's endeavored to raise \$4,760 to rent the land in Hopedale, Illinois, for a corn crop to be planted. In the fall, the harvest will be celebrated. This mission transforms our donation into a crop that typically sells for up to \$30,000. The proceeds then go toward a project in Zimbabwe to teach sustainable farming techniques. Thank you for your contributions which exceeded our goal—more than \$7,000!

### **Camp Mix**

Junior High Camp Mix took place the week of July 11-15 at Indiana Wesleyan University in Marion, Indiana. A group of 14 students and three adults from St. John's attended. The theme for the week was "Broadcast." Students and leaders engaged in biblical studies of the parables of Jesus and took a deep dive into the broadcasting power of His gospel message. Daily worship, relationship building activities, and small group time were just a few snippets of the experiences these young people engaged in.



### Midwest Food Bank

St. John's had 20 volunteers in July who completed 1,330 bags of cheese crackers (133 big boxes) in roughly 2 hours. Deacon Lyn completed the obligatory taste test and declared the crackers good for consumption!

### **VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT**

For the first year of *inTouch*, we've been spotlighting St. John's staff. A common theme among our talented staff is that as good as they are, so much more is possible with the help of willing volunteers. Therefore, we are adding faithful St. John's volunteers to our spotlight. We begin with volunteer Vern Veal.

#### Vern Veal

Vern was raised on a farm in Kearney, Nebraska. He and his family had a dryland farm and produced a healthy corn crop. He worked on the farm while simultaneously attending college at University of Nebraska at Kearney. During his last year in college, he was recruited into the Air Force for a brief time. After graduation, he landed in Chicago and worked at Liberty Mutual and later joined State Farm in Greeley, Colorado.

Vern retired from State Farm in 2004 and decided to volunteer at St. John's. He was aware the Columbarium was dedicated in 1994 and chose to work on that. He assisted people in a couple of ways. Some came to Vern after a loved one passed. Some seized the opportunity to organize the process for their loved ones before they passed. At first, only St. John's members were allowed in the Columbarium but now, it is open to others.

Vern has been a help for those who have to go through this process. He explained the process and shared what to expect. He coordinated the financial aspects and worked with engravers for the name plates. He also alerted us to maintenance needs in the Columbarium as it is exposed to the elements.

Recently, Vern has transitioned to a new role as our inaugural historian to help preserve our history for future generations. He is helping us as we celebrate our 150th anniversary. He works with other volunteers to record activities. He has also been working to organize the many artifacts in our vault. There are many boxes in the vault that contain our history, and organizing the artifacts in our vault is a big job. Vern is accustomed to doing the big job as he continues to serve at St. John's.
