2023 Lenten Collection for Center for Hope was very successful thanks to the members of St. John's. We collected more than 21,600 items including 3,905 diapers, 228 rolls of paper towels, 683 rolls of toilet paper, and 16,504 baby wipes. Mary: Martha, I heard some members talking about a columbarium. Do you know what it is?

Martha: A columbarium is a structure or room with niches for the respectful storage of funeral urns, holding cremated remains of the deceased. They have existed for thousands of years and are experiencing a resurgence in popularity because they're environmentally- and budget-friendly final resting place.

Mary: Does St. John's have a columbarium?

Martha: Yes! St. John's open-air columbarium is easily accessed through the West entrance and the Parish Life Center. It is surrounded by the building and can be viewed via the hallway next to the church offices. It's a calm, peaceful setting where one feels the comforting arms of God. Niches are in a free standing cross and along the South wall. There is seating available for prayer and meditation.

Mary: The St. John's Columbarium sounds like a very peaceful place, but I wonder if one is cremated will they be able to get into Heaven?

Martha: According to the ELCA's website, "Lutheran theology and tradition do not favor any particular form of burial. God's ability to give resurrected bodies to those who bear the name of Christ cannot be stymied by any human action, including organ donation or cremation."

Mary: That's good to know. Is the Columbarium available to all members?

Martha: Yes, St. John's Columbarium is available to all members and members of other ELCA congregations at the time of the purchase. Applicants can select a niche from those available at the time the application is approved.

Joel Murphy has only been a member at St. John's for a few years and has really stepped into several roles.
