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Housing Coalition Impact / ELIZABETH HAINES

You may recall St. John's engaged in a collaborative effort with other local churches to secure funding to assist people with housing relief during/after Covid. We committed \$30,000 to the effort and asked our congregation to pitch in. You gave \$12,600 toward the \$30,000 pledge. Thank you!

The Housing Coalition takes care of the people who have no other local, state, or federal agency to turn to. The need is continuing and we have been able to help with direct assistance of \$3,453.06 and another gift to PATH of \$5,000 to cover housing during the excessive cold snaps this past winter. We have \$21,546.04 remaining from our pledge and it will be used. There continue to be people who are months behind on their rent or utilities, so the coalition will be called upon more now than during the height of the pandemic.

In May I met with Fred Render, and what began as a conversation about renovations quickly became a discussion of the recent changes in practices to focus on reusing and recycling to do our part to protect our planet.

Keeping alive the stained glass cross is a blessing we will continue to enjoy. Another blessing is the fact some of the marble from the altar will become a moveable altar table. Some of the pews, office desks, cabinets, and carpet squares found new homes instead of becoming part of a landfill.

With strong encouragement from Pastor Christine McNeal to "go green," St. John's started a recycling program. Prior to that everything went into the trash. Numerous energy-saving projects, have also been implemented:

- Converted all lighting to LED with a grant from Ameren.
- Replaced all doors and windows on the south side of the building and added air locks to the Atrium and Noah's Ark entryways.
- Switched air handling units from pneumatic to digital and added special controls to slowly ramp up and down the blowers.

Hopedale Growing Project

Hopedale Growing Project is an ecumenical, city/rural partnership between the Hopedale Mennonite Church and St. John's Lutheran Church to help fight world hunger. This project works through Growing Hope Globally, the Christian non-profit organization that encourages volunteer groups like the Hopedale Growing Project and 200 other growing projects across the country to raise money to fund projects in developing countries that help grow lasting solutions to hunger. The program offers training to diversify crops and livestock, use conservation farming methods to increase yields, adopt better storage techniques, and learn financial resource, water management, and basic health education.

Each year the Hopedale farmers raise a crop on 34 acres near their church, dedicating the proceeds to an agricultural training project in Zimbabwe. St. John's raises money to offset the costs of raising the crop. Specifically, the money we raise goes toward the \$4,760 cost to rent the farmland. Local businesses donate the seed, fertilizer, chemicals, and other costs. Hopedale farmers contribute the labor, fuel, and equipment to plant and harvest the crop.

Since 2005, St. Johns has donated more than \$80,000 to the Hopedale Growing Project. We also enjoy the Fall Harvest Celebration each year on the grounds of Hopedale Mennonite Church where we get a chance to meet those who administer the program.

Zambia Education Fund

Each year, St. John's assists pastors of the ELC-Zambia synod by sending a financial gift to help with their children's education expenses. The pastors have called this their greatest need. This helps them to spend time building their congregations and spreading the Gospel in Zambia. St. John's has been helping the 20 pastors of this small synod in Zambia with funds to pay school fees for their children. As the children have grown older, the cost has increased. High schools are not near the children's homes, so students must pay for room and board during the week. St. John's is the only contributor to this fund. Our first contribution was in 2011, and the total given through 2020 has grown to \$84,750! The members of St. John's have been so generous!

Gudrun considers it a privilege to serve the congregation in this role, which has evolved over time. Since 2008, when she began her focus on membership and new member classes, the leadership and staff identified that Gudrun possessed pastoral gifts. At that time Lee Hulsether was the office manager and a mentor who helped Gudrun develop her gifts.

Years later Pastor Christine McNeal encouraged Gudrun to enroll in the Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) internship. This opportunity was a community-based internship, with classes and other tasks over a nine month period. St. John's fully supported her in this endeavor. Gudrun believes this was a learning opportunity and tied well with her role as Befriender Ministry Coordinator.

Through the Caring Connections program created by Pastor Anne Christiansen, Gudrun rediscovered her love of writing. This program focused on checking in with members over the age of 70 with weekly letters. Gudrun matches up caregivers with those needing care by using her gifts of the Spirit.

Gudrun feels that one of the blessing that came out of the pandemic was with the weekly Prayer Gathering on Thursday mornings. Prior to the pandemic, the prayer gathering was held in person, sometimes small in number. By moving the gathering online via Zoom, the prayer group members could still be connected even though some had moved to Texas and Michigan!
